over the past decades epidemiology has made a relevant contribution to public health by identifying health problems and analysing their determinants however recent developments call for new and applied methods to support the planning implementation and evaluation of public health policies and programmes this book presents an integrated overview of such epidemiological methods to be used within the joint working process of several public health disciplines it provides relevant theories concepts and tools illustrated with practical examples in order to empower epidemiologists in public health the first part of this book describes epidemiological history in a nutshell and explains the relationship with the public health domain it closes with the presentation of a joint work cycle for policy practice and research the public health cycle part ii presents seven steps for epidemiologists to strengthen their contribution to the public health cycle conduct a needs assessment support priority setting formulate aims and objectives construct a logic model develop an evaluation plan perform quality control and analyse processes and outcomes part iii is dedicated to successful collaboration of epidemiology with other public health disciplines such as health promotion

zoonoses are currently considered as one of the most important threats for public health worldwide zoonoses can be defined as any disease or infection that is naturally transmissible from vertebrate or invertebrate animals to humans and vice versa approximately 75 of recently emerging infectious diseases affecting humans are diseases of animal origin approximately 60 of all human pathogens are zoonotic all types of potential pathogenic agents including viruses parasites bacteria and fungi can cause these zoonotic infections from the wide range of potential vectors of zoonoses insects are probably those of major significance due to their abundance high plasticity and adaptability to different kinds of pathogens high degrees of synanthropism in several groups and difficulties to apply effective programs of population control although ticks flies cockroaches bugs and fleas are excellent insects capable to transmit viruses parasites and bacteria undoubtedly mosquitoes are the most important disease vectors mosquito borne diseases like malaria dengue equine encephalitis west nile mayaro or chikungunya are zoonoses with increasing incidence in last years in tropical and temperate countries vertebrates can also transmit serious zoonoses highlighting the role of some carnivorous animals in rabies dissemination or the spread of rodent borne diseases in several rural and urban areas moreover the significance of other food borne zoonoses such as taeniasis trichinellosis or toxoplasmosis may not been underestimated according to who fao and oie

guidelines an emerging zoonotic disease can be defined as a zoonosis that is newly recognized or newly evolved or that has occurred previously but shows an increase of incidence or expansion in geographical host or vector range there are many factors that can provoke or accelerate the emergence of zoonoses such as environmental changes habitat modifications variations of human and animal demography pathogens and vectors anomalous mobilization related with human practices and globalization deterioration of the strategies of vector control or changes in pathogen genetics to reduce public health risks from zoonoses is absolutely necessary to acquire an integrative perspective that includes the study of the complexity of interactions among humans animals and environment in order to be able to fight against these issues of primary interest for human health in any case although zoonoses represent significant public health threats many of them still remain as neglected diseases and consequently are not prioritized by some health international organisms

preventing diagnostic errors including missed and delayed diagnosis improves patient safety and saves lives while epidemiological research on patient safety has increased since the us national academies institute of medicine now nasem published 2000 to err is human building a safer health system progress toward understanding the nexus of conditions and factors that cause or contribute to diagnostic error has been measured impeding progress are perceptions that diagnostic errors primarily arise from inadequate medical training overworked and stressed providers and innocent mistakes and subsequently that interventions should focus on training and clinical management however additional aspects that potentially affect diagnostic accuracy have been identified effective communication and patient engagement especially in multilingual and multicultural groups where perceptions and beliefs may not be shared or understood medical conditions with ambiguous signs and or vague symptoms settings with limited access to advanced technologies social cultural and economic structures and organization and management of care delivery recent epidemiological studies indicate that diagnostic errors vary considerably across sociodemographic cultural and socioeconomic groups suggesting that underlying determinants range well beyond the clinical encounters and settings

the present manual tries to respond to the specific needs of occupational health epidemiology rather than a comprehensive review of the subject the book presents a series of articles the first four chapters deal with general principles and definitions in occupational epidemiology and describe the work related hazards and diseases chapter 5 6 and 7 deal with information collection and the use of data in the assessment of health risks and in descriptive epidemiology general methods for epidemiological studies are discussed the following chapters address specific aspects such as the study of combined effects the statistical analysis of epidemiological data the validity aspects of epidemiological studies including consideration on the problems of false positive and false negative results and the basis for causality judgment or the particular interest of experimental epidemiology in occupational health chapters cover two special issues of importance to workers health namely occupational stress and the epidemiology of accidents

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
